



OVERVIEW

See Ireland's oldest city with new eyes after this up-close guided walk filled with impressive sights and lighthearted commentary. First settled as a Viking trading port 1,100 years ago, Waterford also has deep Norman roots - and your knowledgeable guide will share colorful facts and stories about the city as you amble in and out of key landmarks along narrow, winding streets. The historic Waterford City center is barely 30 minutes by coach from the modern port yet seems like a completely different world. Your walk here includes encounters with six national monuments, and visits inside several of them. Among those are the three iconic venues that make up the storied "Viking Triangle": Reginald's Tower, Ireland's oldest intact building; the Bishop's Palace, home to the only surviving mourning cross from Napoleon's death and the world's oldest piece of Waterford crystal; and the Medieval Museum, a modern structure wrapped around very ancient ones, and chock full of rare and precious historic treasures. In addition, you'll have free time to discover Waterford a bit further on your own before returning by coach to the pier.

WAT-012 MAGNIFICENT CURRAGHMORE HOUSE

OVERVIEW

Browse the magnificent residence of the 9th Marquis of Waterford, whose family has owned Curraghmore House and thousands of surrounding acres for more than 800 years. The estate exudes history. As you approach the main house, be sure to notice the statue of a stag with a crucifix between its antlers—the family symbol—atop the old castle. Many of the interiors feature extraordinary plaster work, period furnishings from different centuries and an abundance of personal family memorabilia. The property's Shell House was built almost entirely with colorful shells that one of the 18th-century residents persuaded ship captains to collect from around the world. Other highlights include the oldest bridge in Ireland, a

Sitka spruce that is one of the tallest trees in Ireland and an exquisite Japanese garden. You will see more spectacular sights on the return drive along the Copper Coast, a naturally beautiful stretch of road so geologically significant that UNESCO deemed it a Global Geopark.

- Tour a grand estate that has been owned by the same distinguished family for 800 years.
- Browse the exquisite interiors and exteriors of buildings such as the enchanting Shell House.
- Take in the natural beauty while driving the Copper Coast, a UNESCO Global Geopark.

Enjoy a panoramic orientation drive through County Waterford with a mid-trip stop to savor the joys of a classic Irish pub. Your comfortable coach journey begins at the pier as you set off along County Waterford's scenic Atlantic coast to the seaside resort town of Tramore, its delightful terraced homes overlooking a broad bay. Once a drowsy fishing village with few visitors, a fresh railway connection to Waterford in 1853 set this charming Victorian town on a growth trajectory. Continuing west from here, the cliff road traces a more rugged coastline as it passes through colorful, charming villages like Fenor, Annestown and Boatstrand in a region known as the "copper coast" for the mines that once thrived here. Circling inland, the route heads for the impressive Comeragh Mountains, the rocky backbone of the county, then transitions to fertile farmland terrain as you approach Waterford City. During your journey, you'll have a chance to sip a cool beverage and experience traditional Irish entertainment at a character-filled local pub. After all, what outing in Ireland doesn't include a pub or two?

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Spend a day exploring Tipperary, a picturesque Irish county steeped in ancient heritage and once home to the High Kings. OVERVIEW

Spend hours at your leisure exploring Waterford, an engaging city on the River Suir that the Vikings founded about 1,100 years ago. Waterford exudes history especially in attractions such as Reginald's Tower, which was built for defensive purposes in medieval times and now houses a museum that concentrates on the city's Viking heritage. Other museums hold vast collections of silver, Irish-made timepieces and locally made products such as crystal, which has long been synonymous with Waterford. For a behind-the-scenes look at how this exquisite crystal is created, tour the House of Waterford Crystal. If you wish to do nothing more than shop, John Robert's Square is a great starting point because the streets fanning off of it are lined with stores.

Encounter fascinating history and handsome crafts in medieval Kilkenny, and pay a call on the renowned House of Waterford Crystal. About an hour from Waterford by coach, Kilkenny's origins span back more than 1,500 years – and its marvelous skyline reflects the prowess of 11th- and 12th-century Norman stonemasons. Most splendid of these ancient buildings is Kilkenny Castle; on your self-guided inside tour, you'll encounter Dutch master portraits, fine antiquities and captivating stories about events that transpired within this medieval

fortress-turned-residence. You'll also have free time to explore more of Kilkenny on your own. The Kilkenny Design Center is a great candidate for a visit; here under one roof you'll see the very best in Irish design and workmanship, its gift offerings carefully curated from over 200 studios and workshops around the country. A relaxed lunch will be served at a traditional local hotel before journeying on to the Waterford Crystal visitors' center. While the city's original crystal factory closed up shop in 2009, limited production is still conducted in Waterford, and this new exhibition and showroom takes you through the fabrication process — with impressive finished pieces on display to browse or purchase.





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OVERVIEW

See Bristol from an enlightening water perspective by cruising up the River Avon that snakes through the city, and enjoy gorgeous panoramas of a different sort by riding the Avon Valley Railway. The boat will travel through the heart of Bristol, presenting you with a close-up view of the dramatic Avon Gorge and the SS Britain, a museum that was the world's longest passenger ship when built in 1845. You will also skirt along the restored Old City and the M Shed, a dockside transit building that has been converted into a museum. At Bitton Station, you will hop aboard the train for a scenic trip in a heritage railway carriage. Although the track is just a few miles long, the experience will be much like it was when the railway flourished in the mid-19th century. The sound of the steam engine and the rhythmic clickety-clack as the train travels along the rail will be immensely soothing.

- Cruise the Avon River through the steep-walled Avon Gorge and on to downtown Bristol. Pass the SS Britain, once the world's longest passenger ship and now a museum.

Llancerch vineyards is a great locale to learn about Cariad wines and taste several selections unique to the terroir. The light red made with Triomphe grapes is a favorite. OVERVIEW

Delve into the fascinating history of Wells by visiting its most iconic landmarks—the city's medieval cathedral and the adjacent Bishop's Palace. Named for its many natural springs, Wells developed around the cathedral, whose construction began in the 12th century. Over the years, it became even more magnificent in size and character. The monumental west front is breathtaking, as the façade contains more than 500 sculptures. The interior features classic gothic architecture and an astronomical clock from 1390 that still works today. The ambitious Bishop Jocelyn oversaw the cathedral's early construction, while living at the ornate palace in its shadow. To enter it, you must cross the moat, walk over a drawbridge and under the spiked portcullis door. What a fitting introduction for the magnificence inside, which includes the Bishop's Chapel, where you might reflect and peruse the medieval carved details. A few steps away, you will dine at the Swan Hotel, parts of which date to 1422.

- Behold the gothic Wells cathedral, whose exterior is just as glorious as the interior
- Browse the magnificent, 13th-century Bishop's Palace and the private chapel within.
- Enjoy lunch at the historical Swan Hotel just steps away from the cathedral and palace.

OVERVIEW

Hit the highlights of Bristol and come away with an overall understanding of this engaging city at the confluence of the Rivers Avon and Frome. To reach Bristol, you will drive across the Clifton Suspension Bridge, an icon since its completion in 1864. The bridge spans Avon Gorge with Clifton Village in its shadow. There you will begin an enlightening walking tour past landmarks such as the medieval Bristol Cathedral and Cabot Tower. The latter was constructed in the late 19th century to commemorate explorer John Cabot's 1497 voyage from Bristol to North America. Even so, the city's most significant maritime attraction is the SS Great Britain. Engineering giant Isambard Kingdom Brunel—the genius behind the Clifton Suspension Bridge—designed the revolutionary steam ship, which was the world's first luxury ocean liner. For a bit of fun, you will also view some irreverent street art from Banksy, an internationally known graffiti artist that grew up in Bristol.

HIGHLIGHTS

- See two marvels from the same engineer—the Clifton Suspension Bridge and the SS Great Britain.
- Walk through Bristol's inner suburb Clifton Village, taking in the considerable landmarks.
- Behold the graffiti art of Banksy, an anonymous Bristol artist whose work is world famous.

BRT-004 THE ROMAN BATHS Date: Aug 06, 2024 Time: 09:00 AM

OVERVIEW

Discover the charms of Bath, especially the ancient Roman baths that transformed the city into England's very first spa resort. The baths also contributed to UNESCO declaring the city a World Heritage site. Bath's other notable features include a wealth of historical honey-colored architecture and its location in the quintessentially English rolling countryside. Besides exploring the famed bath complex, which was founded in 75 AD, you will visit Pulteney Bridge, one of few such structures in the world with shops along both sides of its span. Designed in 1769 with pilasters and domes at both ends, the bridge is an architectural gem. You will also see the iconic Royal Crescent, a crescent-shaped row of late 18th-century terrace houses that is considered one of the finest examples of Georgian architecture in England. Free time will also be allotted to browse the shops and perhaps relax over a pint in a pub.

HIGHLIGHTS

- See the Roman baths in Bath, the architecturally rich city that was named for them.
- Behold the 18th-century architecture that helped Bath become a World Heritage site.
- See Pulteney Bridge, one of the few bridges in the world with shops on both sides.

BRT-003 CHEDDAR GORGE

OVERVIEW

Explore the towering limestone cliffs of Cheddar Gorge and the spectacular caves beneath the surface, both of which were formed during the last Ice Age. Besides being geologically important, the gorge is of great ecological significance because of its abundant flora and fauna. Be sure to look for peregrine falcons, goats, Saoy sheep and Cheddar pinks, an endemic perennial with blazing rose-pink blooms. The caves bedazzle in a different way, especially in cavernous areas such as St. Paul's Cathedral and Solomon's Temple, where atmospheric lighting makes the stalactites and stalagmites look even eerier. The largest cave in the system, known as Gough's, has a resident black cat that wears a bow tie—at least that's the illusion that the shadows create in the rocks. In the free time that follows your cave exploration, you might browse the on-site Museum of Prehistory and climb the 300 or so steps to the top of the Lookout Tower.

HIGHLIGHTS

- Walk about the wild terrain in Cheddar Gorge and look for indigenous animals.
- Explore a series of enormous caves with eerily illuminated rock formations.
- Spend free time enjoying other on-site attractions such as the Museum of Prehistory.

During free time in Kenmare, you may notice characteristics that earned it a Heritage Town designation. They include historical, cultural and environmental highlights, many of which are featured in the Kenmare Heritage Centre.

OVERVIEW

Enjoy a short but remarkably scenic cruise to Garinish Island, a botanical paradise that greatly benefits from the warming influence of the Gulf Stream. Chances are, you will see a colony of seals frolicking along the rocky coastline on the way over. Although Garinish Island is rather small at just 37 acres, its gardens are so spectacular that horticulturists and amateur enthusiasts come from all over to admire the collection of rare plants that flourish in the somewhat subtropical climate. More than 100 years ago, English architect Harold Peto designed the gardens in a formal Italian style that blends beautifully with the natural setting. To shelter the gardens, he first planted a belt of coniferous trees, which still stands today. Depending on the time of the year that you visit, you may see rhododendrons and azaleas at their peak, herbaceous perennials and ornamental shrubs in full bloom. The centerpiece is the Italian Garden, with its formal colonnaded terraces and pools.

Whiddy boasts one of the world's finest deep-water harbors and its maritime roots run deep. Following the walk, you will be served a glass of Guinness and a plate of locally farmed, fresh-baked mussels, a treat that has become synonymous with the island




OVERVIEW

Explore key locations featured in the classic film The Quiet Man, which was shot in and around the village of Cong. Despite its intriguing, centuries-old past, Cong is perhaps best known as the primary location for the 1952 film that Academy Award-winner John Ford directed. The romantic comedy starred John Wayne and Irish-born Maureen O'Hara, who shot several memorable scenes in a Cong cottage that is now in ruins. To commemorate the film, the Quiet Man Cong Cottage was constructed as an exact replica of the original and filled with memorabilia from the movie. It makes for a wonderful stop during free time in Cong, as do other film locations such as the Danaher farmhouse, Reverend Playfair's home and Pat Cohan's Bar. Film buffs will also enjoy seeing the Ashford Castle Hotel, another backdrop for the movie. Although a hotel since 1939, the castle dates to the 13th century.






GWY-002 GALWAY THROUGH THE AGES

OVERVIEW

Visit a traditional farm and pause for photos of a 16th-century castle and a contemporary cathedral, all of which offer a historical perspective of Galway. A meandering drive through the gorgeous countryside will bring you to the centuries-old Rathbasun Farm. While savoring fresh-baked scones and hot tea, you will learn how the Connolly family farms the land and raises sheep for shearing. You might also hand-fed the lambs and watch a sheepdog demonstrate its herding skills. Nearby, you will find Dunguaire Castle, which was built in 1520 on a rocky outcrop overlooking Galway Bay. The setting is inspirational, one reason Irish literary figures such as W.B. Yeats and George Bernard Shaw often met here. Galway Cathedral, the last stone church built in Ireland, is another architectural treasure. The design is considered eclectic as it features an Italianate dome, a Romanesque stone interior, a Byzantine tower and Gothic rose windows.

OVFRVIFW

Discover the majestic beauty of the Connemara region, highlighted by a stop in Kylemore Abbey and its Victorian Walled Garden, a remarkable estate restored to its Victorian Era splendor. As you will discover while touring, Benedictine nuns have owned the property for nearly 100 years. Now restored to its original glory, the lakeside abbey boasts dozens of bedrooms and an abundance of Victoria Era innovations. The walled garden has also been meticulously restored using seed varieties from the 1800s so it reflects the appearance of an authentic Victorian garden. Divided in two by a mountain stream, the sprawling garden contains herbs, vegetables, fruit trees and heated glass houses that mirror the ones that were once here. Continuing on, you will soon arrive in coastal Clifden, the unofficial capital of Connemara. It is a serene setting bordered by bogs, the Atlantic Ocean and the Twelve Bens mountains. Following lunch in Clifden, you will enjoy free time to browse the shops.

OVERVIEW

Admire the staggering natural beauty at the Cliffs of Moher and throughout The Burren, a picturesque region where you will explore a prehistoric Ice-Age cave. How appropriate that The Burren is named for an Irish word meaning "rocky place," as it features huge terraces of exposed limestone. At the rugged Cliffs of Moher on the western lip of Ireland, you will behold one of the country's most stunning natural viewpoints. Stretching five miles along the ocean, the vertical cliffs tower 700 feet above the sea. You will discover fascinating details about the geology and history of the cliffs through a virtual reality tour in the visitor center. Later, you will explore the world beneath The Burren by visiting Aillwee Cave, which melting water from the Ice Age carved out of the limestone mountain. You can expect to walk over bridged chasms, past peculiar stalactites and stalagmites, and perhaps even see an underground waterfall.


OVERVIEW

Enjoy perhaps the most stunning views in Ireland from atop the spectacular Cliffs of Moher, which rise precipitously 700 feet above the Atlantic Ocean. On the way, you will pass through The Burren, where you will behold huge terraces of exposed limestone that the sea covered millions of years ago. Even so, more than 70% of Ireland's native plant

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species are found here; the reason The Burren is known as "fertile rock." Hard to imagine, but the Cliffs of Moher may be even more spectacular, as they stretch for five miles along the ocean. The cliffs are named after a fort that was destroyed here during the Napoleonic wars, as "Mothar" is Gaelic for "the ruin of a fort." If it is a clear day, you should be able to spot the ruggedly beautiful Aran Islands to the northwest. At the visitor center, you might take a virtual reality tour that depicts life at the edge of the cliffs.

OVERVIEW

Behold western Ireland's rugged landscape above and below the surface by driving through The Burren and exploring the depths of Aillwee Cave. The Burren reflects an Irish word for "rocky place" and true to its name the region is covered with exposed limestone terraces. However, The Burren isn't barren. The majority of Ireland's indigenous plants flourish there, making the landscape look like an endless rock garden. It is hauntingly beautiful, especially when the flowers are in bloom. The Burren is also home to Aillwee Cave, which melting water from the Ice Age carved out of the limestone mountain. A sheepherder discovered the cave in 1940 while his dog was chasing rabbits, and the caverns have since become one of western Ireland's most enthralling attractions. As you meander through the winding passages, you can expect to walk over bridged chasms, see oddly shaped stalactite and stalagmite formations, and view the bones of an extinct species of bear.

OVERVIEW

The original owner's intention was to build a home to emulate Balmoral, but be even grander than the royal family's Scottish retreat. The castle gardens are extraordinary, as they overlook the wild vastness of Lough Veagh. You might meander through the hidden rose garden, the Himalayan garden and the Italian garden, a serene oasis with classical statuary. Following lunch in the village of Gweedore, you will enjoy free time to browse the shops in Ardara.

OVERVIEW

Delve into the culture and traditions of wonderfully remote Donegal County by browsing the Glencolmcille Folk Village, a replica of a rural village that presents life as it was centuries ago. A panoramic drive will showcase the county's wild remote setting, which should put you in just the right frame of mind to experience rural life dating back to the 18th century. You might meander through a thatched-roof pub, an authentic fisherman's cottage, a craft shop full of locally made merchandise and a school house with a display of poetry by Welsh author Dylan Thomas, who spent considerable time in Donegal. Other highlights include a traditional music performance, a snack of scones and tea, and a revealing talk on home remedies for ailments. Be sure to ask about Father McDyer, who created the folk village in 1967 to employ locals who were emigrating in large numbers because work was scarce.








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OVERVIEW

Hop aboard a boat and go fishing in Donegal Bay with a local that knows the best spots to catch fish. What's biting will depend on the water conditions and the season but be assured that the skipper will take you to the likeliest places to land a big one. All the gear and tackle will be supplied, so all you have to do is concentrate on reeling in the fish. There is no telling what you might catch or how many, as these pristine waters are teeming with cod, mackerel, haddock and flounder. Lesser-known species include coalfish, dogfish and launce, a slender-bodied fish commonly called a sand eel for the way it burrows in the bottom of the sea. The views will be spectacular the entire time, as the bay features some of the most stunningly rugged coastline in County Donegal. Keep an eye out for dolphin, which are often spotted frolicking on the water's surface.

- · Look for dolphin playing in the water and take in the beauty of the rugged coastline.



OVERVIEW

Settle in for a leisurely and immensely panoramic drive through County Donegal, following a circuitous route to the village of Crolly and back. The entire time, you will travel through the heart of Ireland's second-largest county, a northwest landscape punctuated by sleepy villages, long valleys and a rocky, barren coast. Traditional Irish life has been preserved throughout Donegal as you will observe while passing through towns such as Dungloe, which is surrounded by spectacular lakes and rivers full of salmon and trout. Upon reaching the tiny village of Crolly, you will pause at a pub for an Irish coffee and to listen to traditional music. The beloved singer Enya and her family, who make up the group Clannad, are from Crolly and you will likely hear about their early years there. The return drive will be just as memorable, as you will take a different but just as scenic route with occasional photos stops.

The Cunningham's farm is also wonderfully picturesque and an ideal setting for raising border collie sheepdogs. FJ has been training sheepdogs since he was a boy and the communication between him and the animals is remarkable. During the demonstration, they will obey FJ's verbal commands to move the sheep clockwise, counterclockwise or however else he asks. The intelligence, stamina and agility of these invaluable working dogs will soon be obvious. You will enjoy another glimpse at traditional life in County Donegal while stopping for fresh-baked scones in the village of Carrick.







OVERVIEW

Enjoy a leisurely jaunt along the Disert Circular Walk, a 2-mile trail that loops through the foothills of the gorgeous Bluestack Mountains. The scenery will be breathtaking the entire way, but especially at the vantage points that offer sweeping views of Donegal Bay. The trail encircles a national monument graveyard and holy well dating to the times of St. Colmcille, a 6th-century abbot that become one of Ireland's three patron saints. If you'd







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like to visit the historical monument, you can follow a short trail spur that will also take you by a tributary of the Eany Beg Water. The Bluestack Mountains aren't particularly high, but the range is extraordinarily beautiful. A sense of peace seems to pervade the landscape, a quality that attracted religious pilgrims centuries ago. Others came seeking cures for ailments, as certain stones supposedly had miraculous healing powers.

- · Walk a circular trail through the Bluestack Mountains, taking in the gorgeous countryside.
- Follow a short trail to the national monument that lies within the Disert Circular Walk.
- Discover the history of the mountains and the reasons ancient pilgrims traveled there.

OVERVIEW

Stand atop a stretch of coastal cliffs that are among the highest in Europe, an exhilarating experience that will feel as if you're at the very edge of the world. Almost three times higher than the more famous Cliffs of Moher, Sliabh Liag presents panoramic views of a wild, absolutely pristine landscape that are stunning beyond words. On a clear day, you can see the town of Sligo and the Mayo Mountains across the sea to the south. The guide will offer a historical perspective that may reference ancient stone remains that suggest the cliffs may have once been a pilgrimage site. Later, you will have time to reflect on the experience while enjoying scones and a beverage at the Tí Linn Café & Craft Shop.

You will have the opportunity to take part in a re-enactment of a wake, complete with music, snuff taking and a tasting of poitin, a uniquely Irish spirit much like moonshine.

OVERVIEW

Hop aboard a vintage railway for a picturesque train ride to Laxey, where you will see the massive water wheel Lady Isabella. You will travel on the Manx Electric Railway, the longest of Britain's historical narrow-gauge lines. It still uses its original Victorian and Edwardian technology and performs magnificently. Your route will take you through leafy glens and hollows and atop precipitous cliffs with spectacular views of the coastline. After passing over the Glen Roy viaduct, you will disembark in Laxey. There you will behold the Great Laxey Wheel, which was built in 1854 to pump water out of the deep lead, silver and zinc mines. Known as Lady Isabella for the former Lieutenant Governor's wife, the wheel remains the world's largest working water wheel and can still pump four gallons a second. During free time in Laxey, you may wish to visit the woolen mills to see the hand loom that produces the Manx tartan.

Even the hour spent driving here from Douglas is a visual treat - crossing a picturesque landscape of plunging sea cliffs and sandy beaches, rugged glens and wild moors. Once in Cregneash, you'll set out on foot through this remote village known for its thatched, white-wash cottages and simple small-scale farmsteads known as crofts. Heading uphill to the grassy coastal footpath, you'll encounter a landmark rock structure with sheer vertical cracks drop dramatically to the sea below. Walking along marvelous terrain above the cliffs, you'll enjoy breathtaking panoramic vistas from Black Head and Spanish Head, spotting sea birds nesting in the intricate cliff faces and seals frolicking in the waters below; perhaps even a shark or two. A short, steep descent leads to a stretch of water that overlooks the Calf of Man, an offshore islet renowned as a sanctuary for Manx shearwaters and other seafowl. A stop at the Sound Café here for refreshments will hit the spot before the coach ride back to the Douglas pier.

See two absolute Manx icons: the massive Lady Isabella water wheel and Tynwald Hill, venerated symbol of the world's oldest continuous parliament. Your coach journey begins with a spin along Douglas' bayside promenade lined with grand Victorian seaside resort hotels. Heading north, you'll make your way to Laxey, where the Great Wheel was built in 1854 to help pump water out of deep silver, lead and zinc mines. This marvel of early engineering was named Lady Isabella in honor of the former Lieutenant Governor's wife, and remains the world's largest working water wheel at a staggering 72 feet in diameter. You can't miss the Lady - she's bright red and dominates the local landscape. Moving on to Tynwald Hill, you'll soon be standing on truly hallowed Manx ground. This grassy mound commemorates the Vikings who established the Manx parliament known as the High Court of Tynwald in the 10th century. Remarkably, their system is still in place, making Tynwald the oldest nonstop governing assembly on the planet. Legend has it that this eminent hill contains earth gathered from all seventeen of the isle's parishes.







The return route traces an idyllic arc of countryside known as the Plains of Heaven. The name fits.
